**Dear Friends in Christ,**

Today is the "Vocations Sunday" as parishes throughout our Archdiocese reflect upon vocations to the priesthood and religious life. In my previous letter in this bulletin column, I wrote about the crisis of vocations to the priesthood in the United States. I noted some challenges--the call to live a celibate life in a sex-saturated culture, parents having fewer children and thus a shrinking pool for vocations, and fewer priests with more demands on their time means less time spent with young people, so today's youth are not exposed as much to the priestly life. Finally, I concluded my last column reflecting on one of the solutions the American Church has used to address the need for priests--importing priests from other countries. One possible solution that I did not discuss was ordaining women as priests. I know women who would make wonderful priests. Though each ordination celebration is a time of joy, it is also a painful time for me because of the exclusion of women from the priestly ministry. I believe women will be ordained as priests for our Church, but not until the rest of the world catches up with our country in its understanding of the equality of men and women. The Catholic Church cannot ordain women in America until women around the world are treated with the same dignity and respect as men are treated. Otherwise, the Church in those places will not accept women into the priestly role. Since we are members of a universal Church, we find the Church moves slower than we would like because its members come from every corner of the Earth.

**One of the great blessings of having fewer priests has been the explosion in the numbers of lay ministers and in the variety of lay ministers.** The Holy Spirit has been at work by calling forth the incredibly diverse gifts of lay people to serve the Church. Just look at our talented and dedicated parish staff, and school faculty and staff, to see evidence of this work of the Spirit. More and more lay Catholics are understanding the call of their baptism, that they have been graced with gifts that can and should be used in service of the mission of the Church. Thus, not only do we have lay ministers employed in service to the Church but also countless volunteers doing the work of Christ in many different ways. I am convinced that the lives of many more people are touched by the message of the Gospel today because of lay people claiming the rights and responsibilities of their baptism. In fact, my deepest identity is not my priestly identity, but my baptismal identity, joined to Christ's dying and rising in baptism, claimed by God as one of God's adopted children. From the waters of baptism flows my vocation as a priest, as does every vocation flow from baptism. So, I am first of all a Christian with you, and then a priest for you, ordained to serve.

Since we live in the wake of a major Ecumenical Council of the Church (2<sup>nd</sup> Vatican Council, 1962-1965), we are living in a time of great change in the Church. History reveals that the reforms of every major council of the Church take at least 100 years to implement. So, the role of an ordained priest is evolving during this time of change, and all of us, including me, are attempting to adapt to this changing role. Preaching the Gospel and presiding over the prayer of the community of Faith are two essentials. Preaching and presiding go hand in hand in the celebration of the Eucharist, the source and summit of our life as Catholics. To preach well requires a significant investment of time each week--time in prayer, time to study, time to prepare the text of the homily. Along with preaching comes the duty of teaching, which also requires study to know what the Church teaches and why. To be a leader of prayer also means celebrating other sacraments: baptism, reconciliation, matrimony, anointing of the sick. Even though he is the principal presider at prayer, the priest is not the only one who can lead the prayer of the community. Funeral Vigil services, funerals without a Mass, graveside services, weddings outside of Mass--these all can be led by deacons or by commissioned lay people. Another important ministry of the ordained priest is to offer individual spiritual direction and to direct retreats and days of recollection, drawing Christians to a deeper understanding of God's saving love. A developing role of the ordained priest is ministering to the ministers--helping form and guide a parish staff and giving direction to other leaders of ministry within the parish. One of the challenges I struggle with each day is being so busy that some people do not call on me when I am really needed. I have learned that parishioners have not called me or come by the office to talk with me about something very important, because they thought I would be too busy and did not want to bother me. At those times, I feel like I have missed the visit of Christ and am saddened by the modern state of the priesthood.

In order for a priest to preside at prayer, to preach and teach, to offer spiritual direction and direct retreats, to minister to the ministers of the Church--in order for a priest to do all these things and do them well, he needs to be a person of prayer. Daily prayer, where the priest enters into an ongoing conversation with the Eternal High Priest, is absolutely essential. Each priest also is required to take a week-long annual retreat to deepen and strengthen this friendship with the Lord. A priest, like all people, should

never stop learning, so besides the daily reading and study that nourish preaching and teaching, priests are also required to do some form of continuing education. Priests must set aside time to re-create as well. Four weeks of vacation are mandated by Canon Law, plus priests usually take one day off each week (my day off is Monday). The challenge as I see it in the lives of my brother priests and in my own life is finding time during the week to recreate and rest. It is very easy to fall into the trap of working 12-14 hour days, 6 days a week, because there is so much good that needs to be done. However, 70-80 hour work-weeks are detrimental to one's physical and mental health, and a priest working this many hours does not set a good example for his parishioners who easily get caught in the snares of a workaholic culture. Finally, some kind of physical exercise is absolutely essential to not only stay physically fit but also to relieve the mind and body of the stress that comes with the vocation.

What will Catholics have to give up so that priests will be able to do what priests need to do without suffering burnout? "Masses of convenience" will probably be the first casualty of the priest shortage. When there were two or three full-time priests in every parish, Mass could be offered at different times during the week, and a number of Masses could be offered throughout the weekend. However, with fewer priests, fewer Masses will be offered and Mass times will likely be adjusted. Thus, Catholics will have to make sacrifices in order to attend Sunday Mass and daily Mass. Already, there are some places in the Western U.S. where the Eucharist is not celebrated every Sunday. Also, privately scheduled baptisms and other "sacraments of convenience" will no longer be the norm. With the renewed emphasis on the communal dimension of each Sacrament, baptisms now take place at Sunday Mass or at monthly communal celebrations. Anointing of the Sick also happens at Sunday Mass, and more marriages are being blessed at the Sunday celebration of the Eucharist. No longer will every Catholic be guaranteed that a priest will be at their bedside when they die. I still consider this to be one of my most important duties (and most grace-filled) but the reality is I will not be able to be at every parishioner's deathbed. Plus, the Church has changed what used to be the Sacrament of Extreme Unction (Last Rites) to the Sacrament of the Sick, so that Catholics do not have to wait until their last breath to receive this special anointing. Every Wednesday at 3 p.m. this Sacrament is celebrated in the chapel, and every Epiphany Sunday a couple of priests join me as we visit all the shut-ins in our parish, in their own homes and in nursing homes, to anoint them.

**I love being a priest.** I am invited into people's lives at very significant times to witness God at work. Baptizing and then presenting a newborn babe as the newest member of the family of God to the Eucharistic assembly--what a joy! Watching God transform a catechumen in the waters of baptism into a radiant child of God--what an awesome mystery! Presiding over the sacred prayer of the Mass--what an incredible privilege! Seeing the shining, upturned faces of First Communicants on their First Communion day--what a grace! Sitting with a family at the deathbed of their beloved as their loved one passes over from this life to the next--what sacred ground! Learning the grace-filled stories of how God brought an engaged couple together, and then witnessing their vows as they lay down their lives in love of the Lord and each other--what a marvelous love! Preaching at a funeral and naming the grace present in the life of the deceased, bringing the hope of the Risen Christ into the tomb of sorrow--what an amazing opportunity! To daily see the presence of God in the lives of the faith-filled people I serve--what a great gift! The gifts that come with being a priest are priceless!!
